## 10<sup>th</sup> Annual TB Research Day on World TB Day Hybrid edition March 24<sup>th</sup>, 2023

**Joseph Keane** is the Professor of Medicine at Trinity College Dublin and he co-leads the Saint James's Hospital National Center for tuberculosis. His research contributions to the field of 'infection and host defense' include the seminal report of the association of tuberculosis with biological treatments. His group performs cellular immunology and translational research, and his scholarly work has been recognized by his election to the Royal Irish Academy.

**Bern-Thomas Nyang'wa**, MD, MPH, is a British-Malawian medical doctor with extensive clinical, programmatic and research experience focused on drug-resistant tuberculosis and Humanitarian Health. He is the Medical Director Doctors Without Borders (MSF), Chief Investigator of TB-PRACTECAL, a phase II-III MDR-TB clinical trial pivotal in change of WHO guidelines for treatment of rifampicin resistant TB and Medical Director responsible for MSF's HIV and Tuberculosis technical working groups. He currently is a visiting Lecturer at the School of Medicine at the University of Leeds, an Honorary Clinical Lecturer in the Institute for Global Health at University College London and completing a PhD in clinical pharmacology of TB drugs at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.





In many countries around the world – including <u>Handaa Enkh-Amgalan</u>'s native Mongolia – TB remains a highly stigmatized disease, which is why when she was diagnosed with TB as a teenager, Handaa was encouraged to hide her disease for fear for discrimination, especially as a young girl from a low-income community. Thanks to treatment provided by The Global Fund, Handaa was able to make a full recovery after 6 months, including 2 months of hospitalization. She then went on to pursue higher education, lived abroad, and met new people and explored new perspectives, all of which convinced her that she could no longer be silent about such an important part of her identity: that she was a TB survivor. Given her experience, Handaa felt it was important to speak out against the social stigma attached to TB and not only became advocate, she also wrote a book titled Stigmatized.

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
